Harvest time in farming, or gardening, is a powerful metaphor for alcohol recovery, as both are complex processes involving cycles of hard work, letting go, and celebrating the results. This connection can provide valuable insights and encouragement to individuals on their journey to sobriety.

A sustained period of sobriety is a harvest. The "crop" of recovery includes restored health, repaired relationships, and a new sense of purpose and self-respect. While the work is never truly over, this stage is a time to acknowledge and appreciate the progress that has been made.

Patience: A farmer understands that a harvest will not happen overnight; it requires patience and a long-term perspective. Similarly, alcohol recovery is a lifelong process that requires patience with oneself and the journey.

Process vs. outcome: A farmer focuses on the daily tasks of cultivation, trusting that the harvest will come in time. Similarly, individuals in recovery are encouraged to focus on the daily process of sobriety—one day at a time—rather than becoming overwhelmed by the long-term outcome.

Gratitude: At harvest time, farmers feel a sense of gratitude for the abundance of the season. In recovery, a sense of gratitude develops for the new lease on life, the healing, and the progress made.

Community: The harvest often involves the help of a community, with neighbors and family working together. In recovery, the support system of sponsors, therapy, and support groups is crucial for success.







Grapevine - The Grapevine app is always looking for more subscribers. Please consider supporting this important AA resource. Corrections / Pink Can - Area 24 Dropbox access will soon include order forms for literature purchased with Pink Can funds. If you need access, please see me and I will connect you with our Alt Delegate, Nate.

CPC (Cooperation with the Professional Community)

They shared some helpful statistics on where people first hear about Alcoholics Anonymous:

- 35% from another alcoholic
- 30% by finding it on their own
- 25% from a family member
- 29% through treatment centers

District Updates & Group Conscience

District 11 remains active, engaged, and committed to carrying the message to those who need it.

Here's a look at what's been happening:

Over 50 meetings per week – Our District continues to offer a wide variety of meetings, ensuring that anyone seeking help can find a seat, a voice, and a solution. A full list of meeting schedules and events can be found on our District 11 Intergroup website: DubuqueAA.org. (Thank you Patty! Our website coordinator) Strong participation at District Meetings – At our last District 11 meeting, we had 10 GSRs present, representing their home groups with dedication and integrity. They listened attentively, respected the minority opinion, and upheld the principle of the upside-down triangle—because without the groups, none of us would be here today. 2025 General Service Conference Agenda – Our members have been actively reviewing agenda items, ensuring we bring an informed and united conscience to the discussion.

Newcomer Outreach & Sponsorship – Many of our groups have strengthened their newcomer outreach by implementing greeters, newcomer packets, and temporary sponsorship sign-ups at meetings. Corrections & Treatment Bridging the Gap – More volunteers are stepping up to help those transitioning from treatment centers and correctional facilities. We know that the hand of AA must always be there when someone reaches out.

Public Information & CPC – We continue to work with treatment professionals, courts, and local organizations to ensure that AA is visible and available to those in need.

Challenges & Areas for Growth

Meeting accessibility & hybrid options – We are exploring ways to ensure meetings remain accessible, including potential hybrid meeting formats for those facing transportation or health challenges. Encouraging more members into service – Service is what keeps AA alive. We encourage long-term members to mentor and inspire newcomers into action.

Welcoming members back after relapse – The disease of addiction is patient and relentless. When someone returns after a relapse, we remember that our role is to extend a hand, not pass judgment. Love and service are what keep the doors open.

District 11 is thriving because of you, the members who show up, serve, and carry the message. AA is not about any one of us; it is about all of us together. The upside-down triangle reminds us that the real power in AA comes from the groups, the home meetings, and the people still walking through the door for the first time. Themes for Autumn Reflections in AA

Letting Go: The falling leaves of autumn symbolize the need to let go of old, compulsive, or selfcentered ways to allow for new growth, similar to how members are stripped of their old ways to blossom into a sober life.

Spiritual Growth: Like trees that sprout new blossoms in the spring after being stripped bare in the fall, members can find parallels in their spiritual journey, where a difficult period of cleansing can lead to new spiritual growth and joy. Cycle of Life and Recovery: The annual process of nature provides a framework for understanding the ongoing cycle of recovery and personal transformation, with each season bringing its own lessons.

Appreciation for Change: The changing seasons offer a time for members to pause and reflect on the transitions in their lives, and to appreciate God's work in the constant change that leads to a sober and joyful existence.

A Brief History of the Keyway Lodge Group

Keyway Lodge history

On June 19, 1991, the Keyway Lodge Group conducted its first meeting at 1113 Main St., with the Julien Group (now a local Tavern). Its prior identity was at a halfway house located at *Sunnycrest Manor* on 2375 Roosevelt St.

In October 1993, the Keyway Lodge Group moved from the Julien Group on Main St. to the Westside Clubhouse. This move was facilitated by the Wednesday night Al-Anon group moving their meeting to 7 pm in order to accommodate the Keyway Lodge Group, meeting at 8:30 pm. In time the Keyway Lodge meeting became very large and outgrew the Westside clubroom.

The members at that time made plans in late 2003 to locate a facility to better accommodate their large membership. By January 7, 2004, the Keyway Lodge Group had left Westside and conducted their first meeting at *Grand View Methodist Church*, just off of JFK Rd. near the soccer complex. Keyway Lodge today

Keyway Lodge is an open meeting on Wednesday nights that starts at 8 pm. The first three weeks of each month, the meeting follows a discussion format. After reading the Preamble, How it Works, the 12 Traditions, the Daily Reflection for the day, and the Serenity Prayer, the lights are dimmed and a candle is lit, and those gathered share around the room in a clockwise manner, as the Spirit moves. At 8:55 pm, we read the announcements, the Responsibility Statement, and the Closing Statement, before circling up to end the meeting at 9 pm with the Lord's Prayer.

Coffee (regular and decaf) and treats are always served. Literature is always available and everyone helps take the meeting down.

The last Wednesday of each month is "Cake Night," when we have a different format (and shortened readings to open the meeting). Those who celebrated sobriety birthdays or anniversaries in the past month are invited to speak, and share their experience, strength, and hope with the group. After the meeting ends with the Lord's Prayer, we enjoy fellowship over cake and ice cream. Some people come to Keyway just that week to celebrate with the regulars.

For newcomers: a few things to ponder.


"When you can thread a sewing machine while it's running, you may want to cut back on the coffee."






