Just as ideally we awaken every day and face the dawn with renewed purpose, Step 10 teaches us to practice a daily course-correction and maintenance, involving personal inventory, admitting wrongs, and making amends to prevent resentments from building. A spiritual awakening is also a profound, transformative shift in conscious contact and attitude as a direct result of consistently working the steps. Step 10 leads us to a new way of life, lived in the "sunlight of the spirit", and with renewed and appropriate values, peace, and a deeper connection to life.

The Nature: A deep and comprehensive transformation of one's inner life and outward behavior, not just a fleeting experience. We awaken to the light in our fellows and the desire to never be the cause of its dimming.

Our Cause: Often a gradual awakening to a process that comes from practicing the principles of the program through the 12 Steps, and developing the humility and self-examination incumbent in Step 10.


Unique Characteristics: A profound change in outlook and attitude, leading to an ever-growing sense of peace, humility, compassion, and a deeper connection to our own spiritual life and the lives of others.

Logical Outcome: Living with deeper purpose and meaning, experiencing increased openness and acceptance of our own shortcomings, as well as those of our fellows, in order to better live in a state of spiritual health.

#### The Desired Relationship

Step 10 as an essential part of the work that prepares one for and sustains a spiritual awakening. While Step 10 focuses on daily actions to maintain spiritual health, the awakening that comes from a fundamental shift in our outlook, and our very being, arises in equal proportion to the depth and consistency of our spiritual practices.




### 2025 Conference Advisory Actions

A sampling of Advisory Actions from the 2025 General Service Conference appears below. A complete list will be published in the 2025 Conference *Final Report* (available from GSO this fall).

Floor Action: It was recommended that a study be formed to explore the needs of Spanish-speaking members for tools to access the Big Book. This study will include identifying specific needs within the Spanish-speaking community to determine whether a plain language translation of the Big Book is an appropriate tool or if other accessible materials would be more effective to support Spanish-speaking members who face barriers related to literacy or comprehension.

Agenda: A Conference Inventory Implementation Committee be formed with a composition similar to the makeup of the General Service Conference (delegates, trustees, nontrustee directors and staff members from the General Service Office and AA Grapevine) be established by the General Service Board to identify and implement actionable items, based on the inventory report back sessions held at the 2025 General Service Conference. The committee requested that an implementation committee report be brought back to the 2026 General Service Conference.






